



Facing page: A gracious, 700-square-foot deck allows plenty of room for lounging in a hammock, dining al fresco, or catching some rays in a fleet of Adirondack chairs while taking in the view of Montana's Whitefish Range. The timber-framed shelter, constructed of reclaimed Douglas Fir posts and beams with a tongue-and-groove pine soffit, echoes the home's timber accents.
